

Export controls, sanctions, embargo clause

Department of Office of Foreign Assets Control or any other national, international, supranational, or foreign government, any instrumentality, subdivision, executive, legislature, administrative agency, regulatory authority or commission or other authority thereof, or any quasi-governmental, self-regulatory or private body exercising any regulatory, judicial, administrative, importing or other governmental or quasi-governmental authority imposing export controls, economic sanctions, or trade embargoes, including, but not limited to Export Control Reform Act of 2018 (50 U.S.C. 4801-4852); The Arms Export Control Act of 1976 (22 U.S.C. § 2751 et seq.); The Export Administration Regulations (15 C.F.R. § 730 et seq.); The International Traffic in Arms Regulations (22 C.F.R. § 120 et seq.); The International Emergency Economic Powers Act (50 U.S.C. § 1701 et seq.), Council Regulation (EC) No 765/2006 of 18 May 2006 and the Council Regulation (EU) No 833/2014 of 31 July 2014 (collectively, "Economic Sanctions Laws"), against designated countries ("Embargoed Countries"), regimes, entities, and persons (collectively, "Embargoed Targets").

Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, Buyer shall not (a) directly or indirectly export, re-export, transship, transfer, or otherwise deliver the products or services or any portion of the products or services to an Embargoed Target or (b) broker, finance, or otherwise facilitate any transaction in violation of any Economic Sanctions Law. Failure by Buyer to comply with all applicable Economic Sanctions Laws shall constitute a material breach of these Terms and Conditions. Seller assumes no responsibility or liability for Buyer's failure to obtain required authorizations. Buyer agrees to impose compliance requirements no less restrictive than the ones set forth in this Section in its contracts with third parties pertaining to the product or services. The foregoing provisions shall also, mutatis mutandis, apply to information, know-how, and intellectual property.
